## OUR NEIGHBORS ARE JUST BARELY MAKING ENDS MEET

Across our 27-town footprint, more than 300,000 of our neighbors—40% of households—find it difficult to make ends meet because the cost of living is just too high. These individuals and families, collectively known as ALICE® (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed), face constant financial strain and are often one emergency away from crisis.



In CT, 1 in 6 children are food insecure. Among children who are Black and Hispanic, 1 in 4 are food insecure.



Child care providers in our region only have enough licensed slots for 43% of children ages 0-4, creating a shortage in available, quality care.



The avg. 4-year graduation rate is 76% for students in Bridgeport, Stamford, and Danbury, compared to a statewide avg. of 88%.



Meet Elizabeth, a dedicated mother of four boys who balances a demanding job with night college courses, making significant strides toward completing her degree. When a serious illness disrupted her financial stability and forced her to take a two-month leave from work, her savings were quickly depleted. Facing the end of her medical leave with no income, Elizabeth struggled to cover essential expenses. With critical needs financial assistance, she was able to pay her car insurance during this critical time, helping her maintain stability and continue her journey.

# WHAT YOUR DOLLAR SUPPORTS

However, living in a rural area without public transportation made it challenging to find affordable child care for Joshua while she attended school. Critical needs funding helped Haley purchase a vehicle and enroll Joshua in a childcare program, providing essential support during this challenging time.

Doris, a hardworking and loving grandmother, had recently become the primary caretaker for her two young grandsons. Unfortunately, her limited income took a toll on their financial stability, affecting her ability to cover rent, utility bills, and transportation expenses. Critical needs assistance helped Doris manage these expenses, providing crucial support for their everyday needs.

\$50 Per Week = \$2,600 Per Year

Helps someone start a new child care business and care for children, providing essential support to ensure quality child care is available.

#### \$35 Per Week = \$1,820 Per Year

Provides access to nutritious food and essential health support, improving health outcomes and food security.

### \$20 Per Week = \$1,040 Per Year

Supports a program that helps students transition smoothly from high school to college with resources and guidance.

#### \$10 Per Week = \$520 Per Year

Assists with gas, groceries, and essentials for someone rebuilding their life after personal loss.

#### \$5 Per Week = \$260 Per Year

Covers bus passes for a person facing health challenges, helping them attend medical appointments and maintain independence.

#### \$1 Per Week = \$52 Per Year

Gives new school supplies to a child, ensuring they start the school year prepared and ready to learn.
